Lifelong stability

Easy placements

•History/tradition

CONS:

•Low pay

Poor job match

Segregated

•Institutional behaviors

Exploitive


Not self-determined

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

Recommendations for a 6-year plan:

- No new admissions to sheltered workshops
- Workers in the program for 10 years or less converted to a supported employment within 2 years
- Workers in the program for 10-20 years will convert to supported employment within 4 years
- Workers who have been in program for more than 20 years converted to supported program within 6 years

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"The Careless Society" John McKnight



- Citizens, not Clients
- •Participation, rather than production
- "People with DD have been found to thrive & flourish when they escape a forest of professional services and are provided community opportunities to express their unique gifts."

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Supported Employment in Vermont

- •1980 Supported Employment Pilot Program in Barre, VT (Project Transition)
- •1985 Federal Supported Employment Systems Change Grants expanded services throughout VT
- Vermont collaboration between UVM, DVR, DDSD, and DMH
- •1993 Closure of Brandon Training School
- •2002 Closure of last sheltered workshop in Vermont
- Vermont consistently ranks in the nation's top 5 in integrated employment services
- •But, we still have a long way to go!

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Champlain Community Services

- In 1967 group of concerned parents in VT started their agency and sheltered workshop.
- Similar workshops around the country emerged in the 1950's-60's.
- Sanctuary away from the institution and a safe haven from the community.
- · Sheltered workshop built and maintained on charity.
- Developed an insular community.

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Generational Differences

TRADITIONAL

- •Closing Doors of Workshop
- ·Letting go: Loss and Grieving
- ·Not ready, too late
- •Ridicule and abuse
- •Taking away friends and community
- •35 years of tradition and culture
- Care after parents
- Sacrificing safety

TODAY

- Opening Doors to Community
- Opportunity, Risk, Being with non-disabled peers
- Graduating with jobs
- Community work and social life
- •Same age peer group
- Social skills and daily living skills for community
- View sheltered work as reclusive & stigmatizing





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Preparing Children w/Disabilities for Employment Success (Erin Riehle)

DO: 雄

- Engage children with disabilities in workrelated play
- •Begin talking about high expectations early in life
- •Involve kids in decision making
- •Give kids chores
- •Develop patterns of good attendance

DON'T:



- Accompany your child to every activity
- •Wait until age 18 to talk about employment
- •Tolerate behaviors that would be unacceptable for your other children
- •Ignore personal hygiene and basic grooming skills
- •Miss an opportunity to teach the concepts of quality and productivity
